# **APRIL'S THEME: AWAKENING**

April 3: TED Talk: Why some anger can be good for you. April 24: Earth Day Awakening. Spring breaks our hearts open to life's beauty and its moral imperative to act for climate justice. How might we support one another in cultivating the inner resilience for facing climate-change realities? How might we participate in a global re-awakening for the well-being of our planet and all with whom we share life? Service led by Cindy Frantz, Marge Diamond, and Rev. Mary.

# **REV. MARY'S MUSINGS: AWAKENING**



The Soul Matters theme for April is <u>Awakening</u>.

After two years of pandemic, disrupting how we gather, where we go, what we assume about ourselves, our families, our friends, our culture, our world - we are awakening from shock and stress.

What is awakening in you?

For myself, I am aware of disruption of habit and awakening in a world free of my mental constructs.

I feel tugged in two directions - to return to habit (even annoying habit) and to open to Life uncharted, always-forming, inviting me to participate.

I hear Rumi calling out, "Don't go back to sleep!"

I am a bell, ringing.

How do we / how do I / keep listening, keep open to life always changing?

I live on the lake. (Rumi again,) "Every moment, a new arrival."

Neuroscientists confirm that we really can't live without mental habits: If we did, we'd have to eat 24/7 to fuel our brains. (No, that's not an excuse.)

This time of re-opening, of awakening, is a precious and powerful opportunity to open in new ways. To shake off habits of constriction and discover the wisdom in our bodies that yearns to lift us and to dance into an always unfolding present, ringing with calls for help and collaboration and creativity.

May we support one another in opening again and again, in creating new habits that support us for living in life's evolving flow together, living from love - in our relationships and in our efforts for social justice and peace.

# WHY DOES THIS CHURCH MATTER TO ME?

As Olmsted UU launches our 2022 Stewardship Campaign, it's a good time to think about what this church means to us. In 2020, Jim Carney reflected on what OUUC means to him. Here is what he said:

I am basically a family oriented rational humanist with strong nature feelings. Why do I need any religion, church or church building? I get my emotional and religious highs from nature, family and from rational logical thought (I'm a Mathematician, what did you think). I didn't rebel against any childhood religious teaching and I am pretty much an introvert. Why DO I need this church? Because it is priceless to me.

What's it worth to have an extended "family" of caring individuals? Intergenerational and inter-age within generations?

What's it worth to have a gathering place where all ideas are accepted?

What's it worth to have ideas challenged and logically evaluated?

What's it worth to have ethical and moral issues discussed and addressed?

What's it worth to have opportunities to participate in religious pursuit

- -without restrictive dogma?
- -without authoritarian dictates?
- -without guilt laden commitments?

What's it worth to have a church where children are encouraged to think and act according to conscience?

What's it worth to have a beautiful "sanctuary" for peace and solitude of the soul?

What's it worth to have a well functioning facility where we can pursue our religious questions, doubts and beliefs?

What's it worth to be part of THIS caring community?

It's priceless!!!!!

But there is a bigger question here. What is the inherent worth of OUUC?

Yes. Why does this church matter – not to me – not to you - but why does its existence matter in this world? I am here to say that the Olmsted Unitarian Universalist Congregation does matter!

- --It matters because it is a voice of reason in a world of unreasonableness.
- --It matters because it is a voice of compassion in a world that is not compassionate.
- --It matters because it is a voice of liberalism in a world of extremism.
- --But most of all this church matters because it is a home for hope and love in a world much divorced of these basic human compassions.

If this church were to disappear from this earth tomorrow, I would find another way to fill my needs and so would most of you, but this community, this state, this nation and this world would be the lesser for its absence.

This church does not matter FOR me, and it is unimportant that this church matters TO me a great deal. This church matters for itself, for its rich history as a voice of liberal religion, as a haven for the religious rebel, as a sanctuary for those in need of sanctuary and as a home of reason and responsibility. It has been a bastion of hope and support within this community for more than 175 years.

Yes, that's why this church matters. OUUC lives and will continue to live because of its strong voice of reason, its tolerance, its compassion and above all for its love.

# **RELIGIOUS EDUCATION NEWS, APRIL 2022**



Children and youth are welcome and valued at OUUC, and so important to growing our congregation, as we reopen our beautiful building. As you may know, OUUC Director of Religious Exploration, Caitlin Chapman, left that position on March 6 for personal reasons. We appreciate her work with the children, and will miss her as DRE. She plans to continue coming to our church and to bring her own children for Sunday School programs.

Meanwhile, we have been providing some exciting programming for the kids. On March 13, Marianna Carney told the children about John Murray, our Universalist ancestor who brought the belief that "God is Love" from England to New Jersey in our newly established country. They followed a maze showing his route and learned a song about John Murray. On March 20, Sheryl Chow and the children celebrated the first day of spring, looking for signs of spring, and places where animals shelter on the church grounds. On March 27, musician Mary Palmieri led the children in a drumming circle, always a favorite activity for them. Emily Williams helped with both classes.

Rev. Mary and the RE Committee (Emily and Marianna) have classes planned for April (and the rest of this church year.) Your children or grandchildren are always welcome.
