It's the time of year when the people of Olmsted Unitarian Universalist Congregation are asked to pledge support of our community in Fiscal Year 25, which begins July 1, 2024 and runs through June 30, 2025.

Our pledge drive officially begins April 7 and runs through May 5.

There is a very strong (tho' small) core of congregants who show up most Sundays. If you have not joined us for a while, you might be amazed to stop by and sense the great community that has been re-generated post-COVID. People are coming down into Coe Hall at the conclusion of services about noon, and staying until 1pm! Very often some of us are there till 1:30 and even longer! This is happening whether or not there is a full spread of food! All these exclamation points are warranted – it really is amazing! We enjoy each other's presence, and welcome all who show. We are accepting, curious, connecting. We are embodying our new apothegm:

Yet, we long for more of the OUUC family to join us on Sundays in Coe Hall. We long for people in the surrounding areas of North Olmsted and beyond, who are themselves pursuing Modern Spirituality, to join us in our Historic Building, discover UUism, and experience the cordiality and rapport that we can generate together.

We are very fortunate that we own our building and are a non-profit corporation, so we have neither mortgage, nor rent, nor property taxes to pay from pledged funds. Yet we do need money for building & grounds upkeep, utilities, supplies, our website and digital communications, and of course compensation for the staff (the Children's Religious Explo-

ration Coordinator, Office Manager, and Janitor).

You might have noticed that the list of expenses above does not mention compensation for our minister. By now you know that Rev. Mary will be retiring at the end of the year, June 30. In FY25 we will no longer have the obligation to compensate her, although we do plan to pay speaker's fees for professional visitors in our pulpit.

The Board has decided that after Rev. Mary leaves, we will take some time to sort out what we want in another minister. As a congregation, we will decide, for example, what strengths are we looking for in a new minister? What goals shall guide the new minister's work, which tasks must that person undertake, which tasks will the congregation take full responsibility for, and which tasks and activities can be let go?

This past year, your board has given great consideration to the upkeep of our grounds: the failing trees in the back of our beautiful property, and the barn. There are some marvelous upgrades in the lighting and other enhancements in the church building. Security improvements are in the works. We have also paid attention to procedures and policies, and our communications within the congregation and reaching beyond. We are satisfied with our modest financial position and happy that there is such a strong push to continue to operate. Of course, the success of this Pledge Drive will be taken as a clear indicator of what the Future holds for OUUC.

Please look for pledge materials over the next weeks, and be as generous as you can be, so that we can continue to offer Modern Spirituality, and spread our good cheer and liberal beliefs to a wider circle and grow OUUC.









REV. MARY'S MUSINGS: The Gift of Interdependence



As I sat pondering Interdependence, I learned of today's collapse of the Francis Scott Key Bridge in Baltimore, caused by a cargo ship colliding with it. I had a visceral response: a sweeping sensation of energy - compassion (and goose bumps), an ache in my heart.

It immediately opened me to all my experiences of collapse: revealing,

re-membering myself as part of something larger: the human family, the family of being.

Not just as concept or abstract value. A lived, living and felt reality.

We've all experienced forms of collapse: From 9/11 to wild fires to earthquakes to war zones. We are wired to reach out and help.

After 9/11, news from around the world declared, "We are all Americans today." And then, instead of being lifted by that wave of interdependence, our government declared war on Iraq. Lines were drawn. Compassion faded.

Interdependence is.

It is driven beneath the facade of cultural individualism.

The human family needs us to live from interdependence, if we are to make a shift that will save democracy and the planet.

In our spiritual communities, how will we support one another in becoming more aware and sensitive to our interdependence?

Today I am thinking of the emergency workers, putting themselves at risk to rescue those who were on the bridge, even as the structure continues to collapse. Grateful for their courage. Breathing with them and with their families. Calling myself to be more aware and responsive to our "inter-being."

May we continue to ask ourselves and to notice:

How is interdependence calling us today? How does it need us?

How will we support one another in living from interdependence?
